Should we selfishly follow our own convictions at the risk of being considered arrogant or should we selflessly sacrifice our independent judgment for the sake of others while giving up our values? Should we give form to our highest values at the risk of being considered anti-social or should we follow the mob while losing our identity? Should we pursue our own purpose at the risk of bring considered ruthless or should we live as unproductive imitators while burning out? Does happiness consist in reaching independent judgments about the world and translating one's highest vision into reality or does it consist in following the beliefs of the majority and serving them?

These questions are but a couple of issues that Ayn Rand ponders in her 1943 novel, *The Fountainhead*. From October 11 2023, *Ricardo's Time* will offer an exclusive seminar on Rand's perennial novel as part of the organization's newly implemented flagship program "Martin's Time: Studies in Reason, Individualism, and Capitalism." Over the course of two years, students of the program will be given the unique opportunity to study Rand's two major works of fiction, *The Fountainhead* and *Atlas Shrugged*, with renowned German Objectivist scholar Martin Hooss.

Each Wednesday, the students of our program will get together to discuss approximately fifty pages of Rand's fiction with Martin. In addition, students are expected to read one of Rand's nonfiction essays per week. Each Sunday, Martin will e-meet with our students to apply Rand's fiction to her nonfiction, give them practical trainings, and, eventually, mentor our top students in his exclusive study group, "Conversations in Atlantis," which he cohosts with Aristotelian scholar Dr. Carrie-Ann Biondi.

Since the seminars offered by *Ricardo's Time* are interactive, our program is highly selective. While a profound understanding of Ayn Rand or Objectivism is *not* a necessary prerequisite for joining our program, we expect out students to be active-minded, i.e. to read the materials before attending the sessions, to be on time, and to actively discuss with the lecturer.
